California Grape

Vitis californica





General Information

- Edible soft and sweet purple fruits
- Sun Exposure: Part shade, Full sun
- Water needs: Low, moderate, or high
- Cold Tolerance: Tolerates cold to 20-25 degrees F
- <u>Days to harvest</u>: Pick grapes on dry days, and taste grapes to see if they are sweet enough.
- Harvest season: Early fall, around September

Planting Guide

- <u>Time of year to plant:</u> In winter months, around January or February
- <u>Location:</u> Sunny area with very well drained soil. Grapes are compatible with a variety of soil types, however, more fertile soils yield larger grapes usually used as table grapes. If no well drained soil is available, use compost for at least 2 inches deep into the soil.
- Spacing: For less fertile soils, 8 feet apart; for more fertile soils, 12 feet apart.
- <u>Initial Composting:</u> Add compost to the soil up to 2 in. thick

Care Guide

- <u>Pruning:</u> Prune in early winter, where old neglected vines are pruned fully each year, and other sturdier canes cut back 3 to 4 feet
 - Prune off old wood and make way for new fruiting wood to grow, for example, by cutting off wood not growing on the wires
- <u>Fertilization</u>: Use nitrogen rich fertilizers when plants' flowers are blossoming or when grapes are about ½ inch across
- <u>Irrigation</u>: For first year, water 1 inch once a week by directly moistening the roots
 - Once established, seldom needs watering

• <u>Mulching</u>: Not necessary once the plant establishes, but can be useful in the beginning stages of planting
